



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
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GETTING AROUND IS EASY

OPENING HOURS

Most smaller shops are open Monday-Friday, 10.00 AM-6.00 PM, and Saturdays 10.00 AM-4.00 or 5.00 PM.

Many of them are open on the first Sunday of the month, just as there is a growing number of shops in the city centre that are open every Sunday.

Large department stores are open to 8.00 PM all days. Bakeries, florists and souvenir shops are usually open on Sundays, and some of the city's kiosks never close.

MEETINGS IN COPENHAGEN

Copenhagen successfully hosts a string of high-end events, conferences and congresses every year, and takes pride in doing it perfectly. Wonderful Copenhagen Convention Bureau aims to help both you and your guests have a well-planned and enjoyable stay.

CURRENCY

The Danish krone (DKK) is tied to the euro. The exchange rate is approximately 7.5 kroner to 1 euro.

TIME ZONE

Denmark is on Central European Time, which is Greenwich Mean Time plus one hour.

EMERGENCY

Emergency? Dial 112.

LANGUAGE

Danish, but almost all Copenhageners speak and understand English.

Many speak and understand German and French, and most understand the other Scandinavian languages.

TEMPERATURES AND CLIMATE

The month of July is Copenhagen's warmest with an average daily temperature of 20.4°C. January is the coldest with an average temperature of 1.4°C. There are more than 175 hours of sunlight in July, and around 65 hours of sunlight in January.

COPENHAGEN CARD

The Copenhagen Card is a pass that provides free entry or discounts to a large number of sights and attractions in Copenhagen and the surrounding areas.

- Free admission to more than 87 museums and attractions.
- Free public transportation by bus, train and Metro.
- Discounts on restaurants, and sights.
- Bring along two children under the age of 10 for free.

Get the card at the information desks at Copenhagen Airport, the Central Station at DSB, Copenhagen Visitor Service, Tivoli Box Office and selected hotels.

– COPENHAGEN CITY IN JUST 13 MINUTES

COPENHAGEN CITY IS EASILY ACCESSIBLE

Copenhagen Airport is one of Europe's fastest-growing airports and will in coming years be able to handle 40 million passengers per year. It has over 190 direct flights.

Getting from the airport to the heart of Copenhagen is quick and easy. Both the Metro and train service have platforms directly accessed from the airport terminal, and from there it is only a 13 minute direct ride to Copenhagen's city centre.

Copenhagen itself is just as easy to get around in, whether you go by Metro, bus or S-train.

The heart of the city is very welcoming with pedestrian streets and many of the main sights within walking distance of each other.




METRO

COPENHAGEN METRO is a quick and easy way to get around in the city. It currently consists of three lines and 39 stations, but is well on its way to being expanded with 5 additional stations (the extended M4 line opens in 2024). The Metro is in service all day and all night, every day of the week. There are 2-4 minutes between each train during rush hour, and 3-6 minutes outside rush hour and during

the weekends. Friday and Saturday night (after 1.00 AM) trains run with a 7 to 15-minutes interval and 20-minute intervals after midnight on weekdays (Sunday through Thursday).

ROYAL COPENHAGEN A WELCOMING MONARCHY

DENMARK HAS the world's oldest monarchy. The current reigning Queen Margrethe II, actually counts legendary Viking King Gorm the Old (900-958 A.D.) as one of her ancestors. Royalty is present everywhere in Copenhagen's numerous palaces and buildings built by kings and queens throughout the rich Danish history. The Danish monarchy is extremely open – giving visitors unique access to the royal world in their palaces.

Just an hour away in Elsinore, right on the Oresound coastline, lies the impressive Kronborg Castle, 'home' to Shakespeare's Hamlet. The beautiful Fredensborg Palace, famous for an astounding baroque garden and summer residence to the Royal Family, is also located in North Sealand, as well as the scenic Frederiksborg Castle, an unrivalled renaissance castle and home to the museum of National History.

Amalienborg Palace (11)

Step right into the private rooms of the world's oldest monarchy. You will not get this close to royalty anywhere else in the world. Amalienborg is home to the Danish Queen Margrethe II and the Royal Family. Visit the living-rooms and offices of former kings and queens, kept exactly as they furnished them themselves. Splendour, unique artifacts, dresses, and Fabergé gifts.

An interactive model lets you explore the history, and The Bel Etage, is still in official use.

Even today, presidents and kings still dine with the Queen, sat in the Hall of Knights, in this impressive castle.

The majestic hall is adorned by 11 modern gobelin tapestries in exquisite colours. Christiansborg Palace is also the seat of the Danish Parliament.

Rosenborg Castle (8)

Rosenborg Castle is home to the priceless Danish Crown Jewels, the stunning Crown Regalia, and gems that will entice and amaze. The castle is beautifully situated in **The King's Garden (12)**. A leafy oasis, perfect for a rest. The park was created by King Christian IV in the early 1600s for parties and frivolities. Today the park is open to the public.





COPENHAGEN ON A BUDGET

YOU DO NOT have to miss out just because you are travelling on a tight budget. Many museums and attractions in Copenhagen are either free of charge all week or at least once a week, e.g. **The Tower of Christiansborg Palace (9)**, **The Little Mermaid (1)**, **Christiania (4)**, **Nyhavn (2)**, **Botanical Garden (10)** and the public gardens and parks of Copenhagen.

FREE WALKING TOUR: PRINCES, PRINCESSES, VIKINGS AND LAND-MARKS

Copenhagen Free Walking Tours offers tours every day of the year, regardless of the weather. The tours can vary a little from day-to-day, but every tour will take you to famous city landmarks. The walking tours start every single day at 11 AM at the **City Hall Square (14)** and 4 PM at Højbro Plads. Saturday and Sunday there is an additional tour starting at 12 PM at Højbro Plads.

BY BOAT

A vast majority of the city's main sights can be seen from the water. The canal boats offer a tour of one hour. www.stromma.dk/en

COPENHAGEN – CLEAN, GREEN AND SAFE

When flying into Copenhagen you will notice the many wind turbines just off the coast. In Denmark, 38% of the country's electricity is generated by wind. Copenhagen's target is even more ambitious: The city council aims to make Copenhagen the world's first CO2-neutral capital by 2025, and thus a global environmental leader.

Waterfront bathing areas are a natural part of city life, and one of the most beloved ones is the Harbor Bath, **Islands Brygge Badet (15)**, a waterfront oasis for Copenhagens and guests alike.

Canals zig zag through Copenhagen's old inner city, and the many

leafy parks define the Copenhagen vibe. Explore the city by bike or foot and enjoy a picnic at **The King's Garden (12)**, a favourite haven for many Copenhagens.

Since several restaurants, venues and more than 70% of Copenhagen's hotel rooms are eco-certified, there is a good chance that your stay in Copenhagen will be sustainable, whether that was your aim or not.

COPENHAGEN DIVERSITY

A stay in Copenhagen offers a variety of experiences. **The Little Mermaid (1)** at Langelinie, known from the famous H.C. Andersen fairy tale, is one of the city's top tourist attractions.

For a more alternative experience, visit the only freetown in the world **Christiania (4)**. A leafy and unruled city quarter with sculptures and street art.

Enjoy an evening at the **Royal Danish Theatre (16)** (home to the Royal Ballet), visit **Jazzhouse (33)**, a Copenhagen jazz landmark and a warm and welcoming venue, or **The Standard (34)**, a functionalistic building on the waterfront, offering two restaurants.

SHOPPING HOT SPOTS

SHOPPING IN COPENHAGEN includes some of the world's most exclusive brands, Danish design, classic and cutting-edge furniture, tiny, unique shops and department stores.

One of Europe's oldest and longest pedestrian streets, **Strøget (3)**, still sets the standard for high-end shopping in Copenhagen. All the way from the **City Hall Square (14)** to **Kongens Nytorv (17)**, there is a string of exclusive shopping treats.

Right at Kongens Nytorv you will find the large department store **Magasin (38)**. Close by you find design and fashion high flyers such as Gucci, Louis Vuitton, Georg Jensen, Royal Copenhagen and Birger Christensen.

Marc Jacobs and numerous Danish designers have shops on the smaller streets of the inner city. These streets also offer the chance to scoop up a hidden gem, as the shops of upcoming designers often can be found in these quarters too.



At Amagertorv at Strøget, you will find another department store **Illum (39)** as well as its sibling, **Illums Bolighus (40)**, offering the best of Danish as well as international interior design.

GOURMET FOOD & CLUBBING

DANISH CUISINE has truly taken off in the past decade. Excellent restaurants continue to open up across Copenhagen. Several of them have successfully reinvented the Danish cuisine, using local and organic produce such as apples, wild berries, mushrooms and cabbage. Diners are spoilt for choice as the city offers plenty of high quality dining options: from informal eateries

to Michelin-starred restaurants.

Guide Michelin Nordic Cities has awarded a total of 18 stars to 15 restaurants in Copenhagen. Copenhagen's other eateries have been inspired by this excellence, offering fresh, tasty and delicious foods of every variety.

The traditional Danish specialty, smørrebrød (the open sandwich), has also had a makeover and several places across town now offer diverse and new interpretations of this Danish lunch classic.

Copenhagen Cooking, Northern Europe's largest food festival held every year in August, offers a great opportunity to explore the cuisine and so does **Torvehallerne (36)**, a trendy market place with delicacies and treats of the very best quality.

TOP OFF YOUR EVENING WITH A COOL DRINK

Two hot spots in the Copenhagen clubbing scene stand out when it comes to drinks, wine bars, and clubbing. **Kødbyen (The Meatpacking District) (28)** in Vesterbro offers a bustle of life and various restaurants, bars and clubs. The area around **Gammel Strand (37)** prides itself with a string of high-end cocktail bars, wine bars, eateries and new clubs. Enjoy a cold drink, excellent wine and maybe venture onto the dance floor.

COPENHAGEN ARCHITECTURE MODERN AND CLASSIC

COPENHAGEN'S ARCHITECTURE

is a mix of historic buildings and modernity. Ancient castles and church spires reach for the sky – but no skyscrapers can be seen in the heart of the city. This is a conscious city planning decision, ensuring that the city centre is not lost to shadows. Both international star architects and Danish world-famed architects have contributed to the varied tapestry of Copenhagen.

The renowned lifestyle magazine *Wallpaper* has even described Denmark as an architectural amusement park.

The green copper dome of the **Marble Church (19)** glitters in the sunshine, while only a short walk away stands **Amalienborg Palace (11)**, home to the Danish Royal Family.

From Amalienborg Palace you have a clear view across the water to the new **Royal Danish Opera House (20)** by Danish architect Henning Larsen.


Two fine examples of modern add-

itions to historic gems are the **Royal Library (21)**, also known as the Black Diamond, and **The National Gallery (7)**.

The **Royal Playhouse (22)**, by Lundgaard and Tranberg, is situated on the waterfront with its surrounding wooden pier.

Historic architecture varies from the **Royal Danish Theatre (16)**, home of the Royal Danish Ballet, to the world's second oldest amusement park, the romantic **Tivoli Gardens (5)** built in 1843. International architects have contributed widely to the diversity: French architect Jean Nouvel designed the new **DR Concert Hall (23)** in 2009 and world-renowned architect Norman Foster designed the extravagant elephant house in the **Copenhagen Zoo (24)** in 2008.

DANISH DESIGN SIMPLICITY AND SUPERIORITY

DANISH DESIGN, as well as Scandinavian, has its strong roots in a shared fondness of superior craftsmanship, knowledge, superb materials and a strong code of simplicity within aesthetics.

Soft shapes interact with rules of design and materials of the highest quality, making Danish designs world famous. Classics designed by Danish design icons such as Arne Jacobsen, Hans Wegner and Poul Kjærholm are still as sought after as ever, and so is Georg Jensen silverware.

Verner Panton and Bang & Olufsen are other Danish design greats, while new rising stars such as OeO, Louise Campbell, Rolf Hay, AiAiAi, and Claydies are continuing the strong Danish design tradition, receiving worldwide acclaim.

ANNUAL EVENTS YEAR ROUND IN COPENHAGEN

WINTER

Winters in Denmark are generally mild and last from December through February.

Locals have fun in the snow or huddle up in cafés for some Danish hygge (cosiness), or go out to enjoy one of the city's winter events:

- Ice skating rinks set up in several of the city's squares.
- Tivoli Gardens' Christmas Market. From mid November until the first week of January. Tivoli is also open from 2nd - 25th February.

SPRING

Spring lasts from March to May, turning Copenhagen into a vibrant place.

As the first rays of spring sun warm the city, all Copenhageners venture into the parks or enjoy an outdoor lunch at cafés. Springtime events include:

- Tivoli Gardens' annual opening. April.
- Copenhagen Architecture + Design Days. May.
- The Copenhagen Marathon. May.
- Copenhagen Carnival. May/June
- Distortion Progressive music & arts: Different quarters host different days: Every day sees thousands of festive party guests take over the city. May/June.

SUMMER

The Danish summer lasts from June through to August, and is known for the rare and beautiful Nordic light that illuminates Copenhagen in the summertime. Long, warm summer nights give the city a vibrant buzz. Dive into summer activities:

- Midsummer's Eve. 23 June.
- Copenhagen Jazz Festival. July.
- Copenhagen Summer Festival: Rising Danish and international stars from the Classical Music Scene at Charlottenborg. July/August.
- Copenhagen Cooking. August.
- STRØM – Denmark's electronic music festival. August.
- Copenhagen Historic Grand Prix – classic car race. August.

AUTUMN

Autumn in Denmark, from September through to November, is colourful, as the forests and parks change from green to yellow and orange in this period.

The season offers many activities, that should not be missed:

- Golden Days – high culture historical festival. September.
- CPH:PIX – the Copenhagen Film Festival. September/October.
- Kulturnatten – the city is open late for an array of night time cultural events. October.
- Halloween in Tivoli – the popular Tivoli Gardens transforms into a spooky Halloween experience. October/November
